The International Nuremberg Principles Academy dedicates its side event to International Crimes and Refugees:

The presence of individuals within a State Party who bear witness to crimes committed beyond its borders underscores an obligation: their testimony is essential to the pursuit of justice, and neither distance nor national boundaries diminish the responsibility to hold perpetrators accountable for international crimes.

Between 2015-2016, conflicts in Syria and Iraq, followed by the 2022 war in Ukraine, led to a significant influx of refugees into Europe, particularly Germany. Among them were both witnesses to atrocities and, in some cases, perpetrators of international crimes. The presence of these individuals poses a dual challenge: protecting witnesses and victims while identifying and prosecuting those responsible for war crimes. Germany, leveraging universal jurisdiction, has led efforts in prosecuting international crimes. Migration authorities play a key role, as they often detect these links during initial contacts with refugees. This event examines the procedures Germany follows in such cases.
